Cowboys win Shootout

at Quadra

On Friday 19 Mar. the Courtenay R.C.M.P. and the Security Section of C.F.B. Comox competed in the first annual R.C.M.P.°C.A.F. Security Section Invitational Combat Shoot, which was held at the Range at H.M.C.S. Quadra. This competition was initiated to foster the interest of Security personnel, especially junior members, in competitive shooting and to improve proficiency. The competition also allows the R.C.M. Police to become familiar with and fire the 9 mm pistol.

The course of fire consisted of 36 rounds with the R.C.M.P. .38 cal. revolver and 36 rounds with the military 9 mm pistol, with a possible perfect score of 360. Approximately 40 competitors took part in the one day event.

After all the smoke had cleared away, and all the scores tallied, the Courtenay R.C.M.P. were declared the winners.

Their team score was 1396 points. A close race with only 21 points separating the two teams.

After the competition was completed, all participants retired to the Security Sections Lounge at C.F.B Comox where the trophy presentations took place, followed by a well deserved "debriefing"


The team trophy was presented to the R.C.M.P. by Base Operations Officer, LCol. Burrows.

Elections


